Virtually does it

Now read this carefully, because it is a lovely unsolicited gesture from a devoted glass-man who also happens to be a friend and supporter of BGF. The Antique Stourbridge Glass website <http://antiquestourbridgeglass.co.uk> is the brainchild of Dilwyn and Patricia Hier (Dil and Pat), known widely throughout the *Wonderful World of Glass*^{®GF} as the founders of Specialist Glass Fairs Ltd and the National Glass Fair held at the National Motorcycle Museum.

The site is dedicated to 19th and early 20th century art glass produced in the Stourbridge area. It provides an overview of all the various types of glass produced with hundreds of images, many with 360 degree views, and details of production. The involvement of all the artists employed in the creation and making of the glass is described with full census records. Two sections, namely Cameo and Queens Burmese Ware, are in the form of self-contained eBooks. In the research section under museums, in a virtual gallery, is the 'Chinoiserie Cameo' exhibition previously held at Broadfield House Glass Museum.

Well, to cut to the chase, I was chatting recently with Dilwyn about Affairs of State, as you do, when he made the most generous offer to readers of *GlassCuts*. Let him tell you all about it himself:

This membership level gives access to the main content of the site with the exception of access to the pattern books which requires 'Premium' membership. However, once signed up as a 'Standard' member your readers can upgrade for a fee of £12; **£10 of which goes direct to the BGF to support their endeavours.** (Note that last bit in bold - Ed). Then you will be able to see the many galleries of patterns, extracted and collated for each type of glass and artist.*

*To subscribe please email a user name to info@antiquestourbridgeglass.com with the subject: **BGF166 requesting membership.** You will be registered in the membership records and will receive an email requesting you to complete the registration i.e. define your password. Then you are good to go. As a tip, go to the bottom of the home page and click on the 'How to use this site' link.*

* Here's an encouraging piece of news from Jane Lamine, Business Operations Manager at Dudley MBC: *'Hallo Graham. I am pleased to tell you that we are reopening the Red House Glass Cone site to the public on Monday 3rd August. The cone itself will remain closed pending surveys but all craft and commercial studio tenants will, where possible, reopen. During the next few weeks maintenance works are being carried out in and round the site, including painting of external windows on the High Street boundary. As a result traffic measures will be in place 13th - 17th July from the traffic lights outside the building past the bridge towards Wordsley. I also intend to reopen the Himley stores from the 1st August.'*
